## Summary of Minutes from September 15th, 2007 Business Meeting

Meeting called to order at 10:07 a.m. By Vice President Tracy Waller

**Membership:** Pat Bucknell gave update on membership web site. Approximately 276 members.

**Treasurer's Report by Laura Atkinson:** Total Breastfest profit for this year was \$8,746.05.

### Regional Reports:

SE Region by Jean Cooper: Spoke of grant recipient activities and suggested that pictures be added to the website along with a link to "nofreelunch.com."

NE Region by Liz Mazeth: Announced that on September 22nd there will be a "Community Baby Sower" and the Welcome Home Program will have a Baby Wear Day. Denise Reville will host a program at Independence Women's Health Center with Maria Biancuzo guest speaker. WBW celebrated with "Day at Cleveland Zoo." There were about 800 gift bags given out.

NW Region by Michelle Price: Received update from Lori Nester (Allen County WIC) regarding Heartbeat of Lima Library Grant received from OLCA. Lori currently reviewing videos and is still deciding on a selection of books. She anticipates completion in September 2007. Bookplate stickers will be placed on the covers of the books recognizing OLCA as a financial provider of the project. Up-coming meetings in NW area in September and October given.

Central Region by Esther Gillett: For World Breastfeeding Week they had "Breastfeeding is a Lifesaver" at their Farmers' Markets— it was a Beach Theme. *(See report by Deb sent after meeting see notes following the minutes)*

SW Region by Georgette Hall: WBW activity a "Picture Party" where moms came in and decorated their own photos and put them in frames. Packets to Physicians. Breastfeeding awards for employers and or schools, and non-sippy cups were handed out. **Lynn Schwarberow from Southview Hospital had a breastfeeding friendly inspection waiting to hear on this—it takes 6 to 8 weeks.**

### OLD Business:

Pump rental coverage— there was a problem with moms getting reimbursed when renting Lactina pumps. DME's want to stop rentals because there is a problem with getting them returned. Noreen says they have a system set up that works for them— Moms can either rent a Lactina or purchase a Pump in Style based on her recommendation of the most appropriate pump for mom. CareSource, Medicaid and other state-funded medical insurances are providing the reimbursements. Dee says they have phased out Lactinas because they get no reimbursement, so they are using classic or symphonies. Medicaid providers are switching HMOs every 30 days. Hospitals have a grant for Lactinas for moms that have insurance but their insurance won't pay for a pump. Managed care providers may only want to provide one type of pump for all moms.

OLCA Webpage update by Donna Walls: The "contact us" button is now functioning properly on the webpage. Donna has received several correspondences.

## **New Business:**

New Hampshire Safe Sleep pamphlet– Dee’s group went to visit the assistant HC in Cincinnati. In October there will be a two day conference on infant death.

Cincinnati put together a pamphlet– Resolving Infant Sleep Controversies Sensibly (RISCS). The pamphlet uses UNICEF information.

National Health Freedom Coalition provides “safe harbor” for helping moms breastfeed– this is hand in hand with the Good Samaritan Law.

### **Central Region Report by Debra Zwolinski**

The Central Ohio Milk Bank is sending out milk to 23 hospitals in Ohio as well as in the states of Delaware, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Maryland and Wisconsin. Deb says to spread the word that they can always use donors. In the past 3-4 months, they have dispensed over 11,000 ounces per month with 13,000 going out in August. The big concern is having enough milk to meet all the requests. The collection sites are: Cincinnati Children’s, Dayton Children’s, O’Bleness Memorial Hospital in Athens and St. Vincent Hospital in Toledo. The Elizabeth Blackwell Center at Riverside hosted the annual “Baby Fair” on Wednesday, August 1st. La Leche League of Ohio Conference will be held October 19th and 20th at the Marriott in Dublin, Ohio. Susan Purdy at OSU Hospital Reports: “We are rolling out a personalized health care plan for women and infants which encompasses skin-to-skin and will be a “lead-in” to breastfeeding. Our lactation staff will be doing presentations to the nursing staff in September about assisting mothers with breastfeeding and using the consultants after a needs assessment has been completed. I was asked by one of the family practice physician groups to present on “LATCH” and I am hearing many positive comments and that they want more! They are starting to visit moms on home visits in the first week and because the moms are presenting issues r/t breastfeeding they have asked us to teach about it.

## **Cooking for Milk and Soy Protein Intolerance by Jane Wise**

### **Notes by Nancy Howe**

Jane defined milk and soy protein intolerance (MSPI) as being intolerance to the proteins in milk and soy, not allergies, similar to lactose intolerance not being an allergy to milk. The symptoms can be quite severe and disruptive of family life when an infant is involved. Symptoms include, but are not limited to any of the following: blood in the stool, mucus, green leafy stool (like spinach), rash/atopic eczema, constant crying (i.e. greater than 18 hours per day), projectile vomiting, red umbilicus, bringing the legs toward the abdomen, refusing feedings or constant eating, weight loss, wheezing.

Approximately 42% of infants with GERD have milk protein intolerance. Most infants (95%) outgrow the intolerance by about 18 months and can go on to have regular milk. Milk allergies are not outgrown, although symptoms may change. There is about a 3-7% incidence of MSPI. For diagnosis, breastfeeding moms need to eliminate all milk and soy sources from their diet for at least 3 weeks, then a challenge can be done. This will give a definite diagnosis if symptoms return. With any possibility of an allergy, challenges may need to be done where medical help is available in case of a severe reaction.

Jane listed the most common allergens in western populations: milk, eggs, fish, shellfish, peanuts, tree nuts, wheat and soy. She follows the recommendation that if allergy or intolerance is present, peanut butter should be avoided until 3 years of age. She also agrees with the recommendation of no solids until 6 months of age.

After one year of age the child can be challenged with a food containing soy protein for two weeks or more before adding anything else with milk or soy. If all goes well, soymilk can be added. Next, a food with a milk protein ingredient may be added for two weeks, and then milk can be tried. If everything goes well, milk and soy foods can be safely used. Most infants outgrow the intolerance by 18 months, but it may take longer if not diagnosed early.

Editorial Comment: This may be an explanation for the infants that are diagnosed with lactose intolerance or milk allergy, but switch to milk at one year with not problems. Certainly more research needs to be done, but eliminating milk and soy from the diet when the infant shows symptoms of intolerance would be prudent.

Dear

We are writing on behalf of the Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance to update you and your organization regarding the change in name and the progress being made to develop a well-functioning state breastfeeding coalition in Ohio. This work is being accomplished by the original breastfeeding coalition delegates from our state to the CDC/USBC Conference, January 2006 in Washington D.C. and others who have since joined. You or a representative of your group may have participated in the OLCA formation meeting November 2005 or the initial coalition development meeting in April 2006, the day before OLCA *Breastfest*.

As anticipated, progress has been slow. Participants heard time and again during the CDC/USBC Conference that forming a well-functioning statewide coalition is rarely a speedy process. During its first six months the Interim Leadership Committee focused on developing a model for coalition structure. Much of this work occurred during a brainstorming session held at the 2006 development meeting. The work from that session is included with this letter. The Interim Leadership Committee also began to search for Northern and Central Ohio representatives to facilitate lay and professional support group involvement in ongoing coalition activity. The Interim Leadership Committee continued to participate in the bi-monthly CDC/USBC telephone conference calls.

Because the original name used for the coalition (Ohio Breastfeeding Coalition) was registered and articles of incorporation filed with the Ohio Secretary of State by an individual not affiliated with the original coalition in March, a new name was chosen for the original coalition. Those affiliated with the original coalition development work are now part of the Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance.

The Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance vision, mission and goals are those that were developed and agreed upon in 2006. These items are posted on the Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance web site at [www.ohiobreastfeedingalliance.org](http://www.ohiobreastfeedingalliance.org). The short-term goals that Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance committee members set out to accomplish from 2006 through 2007, including a statewide breastfeeding-related Needs Assessment, have been met. Currently, the Needs Assessment data is being analyzed so that activities can be developed move forward on the goal of establishing breastfeeding in Ohio as a "Health Initiative and Disease Prevention Strategy". Then, we will all be able to say "OHIO BREASTFEEDS".

Your comments and suggestions, whether as an individual or collectively, are welcome. You may contact the Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance via the snail mail or email address listed above. It is also possible to contact us through the web site. Another letter, which will be one of invitation to join The Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance, is to be mailed to you soon. A statewide meeting is being planned for the spring of 2008.

Please join the statewide dialogue as the Ohio Breastfeeding Alliance continues to grow and develop. The Interim Leadership Committee is looking forward to the new CDC/USBC web site currently under development and possible state affiliation in the future as USBC explores that option as a national organization.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) conducts several exciting programs in support of breastfeeding, including the State Breastfeeding Report Card, National Immunization Survey with its current data on breastfeeding of the 2004 Birth Cohort, Guide to Breastfeeding Interventions, research papers authored by CDC staff; the recently-launched Maternity Care Practices Survey, and much more. The Office on Women's Health (OWH) and Agency for HealthCare Research and Policy (AHRQ) recently released the stunning report "*Breastfeeding and Maternal and Infant Health Outcomes in Developed Countries*" but has been prohibited from issuing a press release. The Maternal-Child Health Bureau of the Department of Health & Human Services will soon launch its training program on "The Business Caser for Breastfeeding."

The National Business Group on Health accepted USBC's input on a Model Benefits Program for employers that includes payment / reimbursement for lactation care and services, including services provided by IBCLCs.

On Oct 22, 2007, all editors of professional journals worldwide have agreed to publish something on breastfeeding. *Breastfeeding Medicine's* editor-in-chief Dr. Ruth Lawrence will publish an editorial statement.

Some confusion has arisen about the relationship between State Breastfeeding Coalitions and USBC. To clarify, no coalition can claim to be a "branch" of the USBC, or "authorized" by USBC. A Coalition Registration program to enhance communication between state coalitions and USBC was launched in fall 2007. **Dear OLCA members,**

Please. I could use some assistance from OLCA friends and members to determine how we can work together as a group to help Medicaid patients continue to have access to electric breast pumps. This project has kept me very busy in the past year.

For over 25 years Medicaid has reimbursed Durable Medical Equipment Supplier (DMEs) at Medicaid rates for rental of a hospital-grade electric breast pump for up to 90 days for a Medicaid breastfeeding mother with medical necessity. There are "Lactation Pump" policies in place through Medicaid Fee-For-Service to provide hospital-grade electric breast pumps to Medicaid breastfeeding mothers with medical necessity. Previously, all Medicaid patients were covered on a Medicaid Fee-For-Service plan with reimbursement from Medicaid to health care providers and to DMEs.

Over the past 18 months Ohio has been implementing a Medicaid Managed Care Plan System throughout the state. Now with Medicaid Managed Care Plans, each MCP company is different in how they manage the care of patients. Some MCPs have not been covering hospital-grade electric breast pumps unless the baby is in the NICU or there is mother-baby separation with the mother going back to work or school.

A few of the MCPs refuse to cover hospital-grade electric breast pump rentals for any medical necessity. This means these MCPs will not cover any medical diagnoses, ie. sore bleeding nipples, severe engorgement, low milk supply, slow weight gain in ineffective nurser, etc. No medical diagnoses of any kind are covered. This year many mothers and babies have been denied access to a hospital-grade electric breast pump even though they desperately needed one. Many mothers have given up breastfeeding because they had no efficient way to collect breastmilk to supply to their babies.

These MCPs are not following the Ohio Medicaid rules and policies for medical necessity for rental of breast pumps. All Medicaid Managed Care Plans are governed by the Ohio State Medicaid Bureau for Managed Health Care (BMHC). The BMHC compliance unit has been looking at my complaints. They will review all complaints.

Medicaid Managed Care Plans (MCPs) are divided up throughout the state. Do you know which companies serve your region? Within each region are three Managed Care Plans.

Medicaid MCPs: *Unison, CareSource, Buckeye Community Health, Molina, WellCare, Paramount, Anthem*

Please check to see if any or all of the MCPs are covering hospital-grade electric breast pumps (E0604) through your DME or other DMEs in your town or region. Which MCPs are not? *Please let me know.*

In July 2007 a new policy took effect at Ohio Medicaid. This policy was written for Medicaid Fee-For-Service so it has not transferred effectively over to Medicaid Managed Care. This new policy involves a DME supplying a purchased professional-grade or personal-grade breast pump (E0603) as an alternative to a hospital-grade electric rental breast pump to a Medicaid breastfeeding mother with medical necessity. (This is not a hospital-grade pump). Several of the Medicaid Managed Care Plans seem interested in this policy but to my knowledge none of the MCPs have reimbursed DMEs for the purchased pump supplied to a Medicaid breastfeeding mother.

Since this new policy has taken effect I am worried that DMEs may no longer be willing or able to rent hospital-grade electric breast pumps to Medicaid breastfeeding mothers. Please let me know if the DMEs in your area are still willing to rent hospital-grade electric breast pumps to Medicaid breastfeeding mothers.

***Please. I need your feedback.*** This is important for the Medicaid breastfeeding mothers and babies in the state of Ohio. Thanks for your assistance.
